Hey all,

It's been a minute! We wanted to pop back in and share a few updates:)

Good news - the combined 60 families currently sheltered in the Ramada and Studio 6 will be covered for another month. Also in good news, the State and County (with support from us & other CBOs) applied for, and were just granted, some FEMA money to support newcomers! The award is less than we (and they) hoped, and we do not know when or how it will be distributed, but the advocacy asylum seekers and solidarity community did at the County level this year was critical in pushing the state to apply for these funds. So, we'll take the win!

We are currently trying to scale back our involvement in the high-intensity triage and mutual aid work we've been doing, though we are still intending to hold some role there. Currently, we are focused on working with organizations, government partners, and the community themselves to envision what a functional reception system could look like. We know there will be a need for more advocacy and we will be in touch as things arise!

In the meantime, please do not forget to sign up for the PIRC Hotline Dispatcher info session and training through their Interest Form! You can read about the expectations here, and please feel free to share! Once folks have expressed interest, PIRC will reach out to schedule a training.

In addition, a number of our families are being rehoused by Catholic Charities (woohoo!) and our partners at CC have asked for our support in collecting furniture donations. If you have furniture to donate, please let us know and we will be in touch shortly about where to bring the furniture!

PIRC FAQ

What is the PIRC Hotline?

The PIRC Hotline is a volunteer-run hotline that immigrant and other community members can call for support responding to ICE behavior, deportation defense, and other immigration related issues and referrals.

Due to the increasing need for shelter for arriving asylum seekers, the PIRC Hotline has begun receiving calls from new arrivals, collecting basic information, and referring new Portlanders to the Asylum Solidarity Collective, homeless services, and other resources for unhoused newcomers.

Who calls the PIRC Hotline?

The Hotline is meant as a resource for undocumented and under-documented immigrants in the Portland Oregon Metro area, including arriving asylum seekers, but anyone in the community can call. Currently, most calls are in Spanish or English.

What is expected of PIRC dispatchers?

Be available for four shifts of three hours each month (flexible, and you may not receive any calls during your shift!)

Conversational fluency in English and another language (most calls are in Spanish but French, Haitian Creole, Farsi, Portuguese, Russian, Arabic, & others also needed!).

Work to apply trauma-informed practices and navigate conversations with people in crisis.

Understand your limits and boundaries & ask for help.

Attend dispatcher trainings to learn more resources!

What is not expected of PIRC dispatchers?

Social work training or encyclopedic knowledge of resources.

Full time availability.

Multilingualism or full fluency.

Immigration legal experience (the hotline does NOT give legal advice!)

- Connection, focus and purpose in a virtual setting

- <u>Say What You Mean</u>: A Mindful Approach to Nonviolent Communication by Oren J. Sofer, including skill building around curiosity and care.
- <u>Caste: The Origins of our Discontents</u> by Isabel Wilkerson. How we have been shaped by a hidden caste system.
- <u>Democracy Awakening</u>: Notes on the State of America by Heather Cox Richardson. What we need to do to reclaim democracy.
- <u>How We Win the Civil War</u>: Securing a Multiracial Democracy and Ending White Supremacy for Good by Steve Phillips, including analysis of how the Confederates have never stopped fighting.
- <u>Indian Country 101</u> learn Native history in the US up to the present. Build skills to offend natives less and engage with tribes more effectively.

How Do LEARNING CIRCLES Work?

- Each cohort (typically 4-12) gathers for a series (from 6-12 sessions) of facilitated Zoom discussions.
- Register for specific Learning Circle(s).
 Meeting dates & times vary.
- Everyone is given the opportunity to share reactions, then discuss as a group
- We ask that you plan to attend all sessions so we can build bonds of trust and insight



TESTIMONIES, NOT TESTS OF THE FAITH

The United Church of Christ embraces a theological heritage that affirms the Bible as the authoritative witness to the Word of God, the creeds of the ecumenical councils, and the confessions of the Reformation. The UCC has roots in the "covenantal" tradition—meaning there is no centralized authority or hierarchy that can impose any doctrine or form of worship on its members. Christ alone is Head of the church. We seek a balance between freedom of conscience and accountability to the apostolic faith. The UCC therefore receives the historic creeds and confessions of our ancestors as testimonies, but not tests of the faith.
